Before submitting your article to JYI, you must agree with the following statements. Any questions regarding the submission policy should be directed to sre@jyi.org.

Policy body

I/We agree that my manuscript does not contain any plagiarized content as defined below (from plagiarism.org):

- Turning in someone else's work as your own.
- Copying words or ideas from someone else without giving credit.
- Failing to put a quotation in quotation marks.
- Giving incorrect information about the source of a quotation.
- Changing words but copying the sentence structure of a source without giving credit.
- Copying so many words or ideas from a source that it makes up the majority of your work, whether you give credit or not (see our section on "[fair use](#)" rules).

JYI uses iThenticate anti-plagiarism software to help identify infringements of the above rules. Violating any of these points three times or more will result in the manuscript being deemed as plagiarised. If a manuscript is considered plagiarised it will be rejected, and you may not submit any further articles to JYI. Your advisor may also be informed of the transgression.

I/We have not submitted any similar work to other journals. If in the future I/We do, I/We will inform JYI, in order to deal with copyright issues.

Review Procedures and Policies

Review Process

The *Journal of Young Investigators* uses a very thorough peer-review and editing procedure to assess review and research manuscripts for scientific accurateness, originality, and significance. All manuscripts submitted to *JYI* for consideration as an Original Research Article or Review Article is reviewed and edited by at least two experienced undergraduates, majoring in relevant fields of science and engineering, before it is published. Less than 20 percent of the hundreds of reports submit each year are published in *JYI*. Each manuscript published in *JYI* has undergone hundreds of hours of work by editors and proofreaders who ensure that each published manuscript meets our exact standards.

JYI maintains a database of approximately 40 undergraduate reviewers worldwide in virtually all areas of scientific and engineering expertise. In the majority of situations, two peer reviewers evaluate each submission within three weeks, and submit two review forms to the Senior Research Editor. At all stages of the peer review process, manuscripts are considered privileged communications. The copying of manuscripts, showing them to anyone, and discussing personal evaluations or recommendations is strictly prohibited, and all manuscripts are destroyed after reviews are completed. Additionally, peer reviewers are ordered to report immediately to the Senior Research Editor if any possible personal, professional, or financial conflicts of interest with the authors or related to the topic. If this situation occurs, the Senior Research Editor and editorial board will then find another suitable review in their place.

With the use of peer reviews and their own judgment, associate editors decide whether to reject a manuscript or to bring it forth for discussion with the respective Research Editor in the discipline and the Senior Research Editor. After discussion, each submission is assigned to one of four categories: rejection, accept with minor revisions, accept with moderate revisions, and accept with major revisions.
